See HF01 for information about Fanny Willburn and her family living in this area. See B05 for information on the extended Willburn family. The combined Willburn parcels (HF01-- James E. Willburn, Fannie Willburn--HF06, and HF07, see also IA02) were the location of a substantial homestead. As noted in the Historic Trails section and at HA06, a number of trails meet at the "Fannie Willburn place" and the Caution Post Office (location #2) was here there was also a school located in this area for a short period (see Caution/North Fork School).

The plotting of this tract on the Base Map was somewhat problematic due to problems with the original GLO survey. For that reason it was plotted based on the USGS and 1977 SRNF maps. This tract was private at the time it was visited in the mid 1980s for the Brown Land Exchange (CRIR on file HR SRNF). A copy of the map for the homestead entry is included at the end of this section.

This 40 tract was applied for after the entry on HF06 was found to have only 120 acres of "agricultural" lands under the NFHA. Willburn later applied for this 40 acre tract. See tract map below. The tract was opened to homestead entry in a letter dated July 3, 1914 (in hard copy file). The *Report on Forest Homestead Application* was filed on June 14, 1914. There were no improvements on the land but the report noted that:

The arable portion of the twenty-five acres will grow good crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn, and other grains...

...12 acres has a stand of yellow pine...In most part, the pine will average about 180 years in age. No possible chance to dispose of this timber for many years to come, the land is very inaccessible.

The report also notes that:

The applicant in this case has exercised her rights under the Indian Allotment Laws having acquired certain land in section 28 of this same town ship and range." [IA02]

The file is incomplete but it appears that the land was eventually listed as it is now private property (as of the SFNR 1977 map A2: 21b). See HF01 and HF06 for a discussion of when they Willburns left this area and moved to Round Valley.

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CENERAL DESCRIPTION

1. Location:

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- (a) Forty (40) acres applied for.
- (b) SE NE, Section 29, T 4 S, R 8 E, H.M.
- (c) This tract is situated in the watershed of the North Fork of Eel River, and is about 1 mile East from this stream. The nearest wagon road is at Hoaglin Valley, four miles distance. The only present means of reaching the tract is over rough mountainous trails. Eight or ten families reside in this township. Covele, Wendocino County, the nearest town of importance, 25 miles distance by road and

2. Settlement:

- (a) There has been no settlement of any kind made on the tract.
- (b) There is no improvements of any king on the tract and no crops grown. There is no claims whatever to the land. In the past the land has been used only for grazing purposes by stockmen living near. The tract furnishes an abundance of good feed, in the form of native grasses.

3. Claime:

(a) There is no conflicting claims to the land. No mining claims or mineral in any quantity known to exist in this locality. If listed no small tracts of National Forest land will be isolated. The tract adjoins patented and listed lands on the North, East and West.

climate:

- (a) Moderate. Annual precipitation about 60 inches, 3/4 rainfall, 1/4 snowfall. Dry season usually extends from about June 15 to October 15. Rainy season October 15 to June 15.
- (b) Killing frosts last occur about May 1 and again occur about October 1, with possible exceptions. Extreme winter cold 10° above. Extreme summer heat 105° F.H.
- (c) Pay crops of all kinds, fruits and vegetables.

5. Public Uses: 10 of the for the fine of the first of th

- (a) The tract is not needed for any public use. The tract has never been posted as an administrative site or for any use.
- (b) No needed exceptions for roads, trails, telephone lines or for other purposes.
- (c) The tract has no relation to a drivable stream.
- (d) The tract does not include or control any power sites, and it could be of no possible value in connection with any mater supply either for irrigation, or power.
- (e) The tract is not nocessary in the protection of a watershed or a City's water supply.



Location and Acreage:

- (a) Same description as given under paragraph 1. Patented lands on the North and East. Listed lands on the West. No National Forest land would be isolated or separated from the principle body of Forest, should this land be listed.
- (b) Area recommended for listing, forty (40) acres.
- (c) The applicants Son, %m. Axton, acting for his mother was present and consulted during the examination.

7. Topography and Soil:

(a) The tract is mountainous. Thirty acres a gentle slope.
10 acres in the Eastern portion rather steep, a 25 per cent slope. The remaining part will not exceed 15 per cent.



- (b) A few small ledges of solid rock in the NE portion, not exceeding one acre in all. A gray porfory rock. Only a few scattering surface rock, not extensive enough to be detrimental to farming. The greater part of the tract is heavy gray sand loam, a few acres (7 or 8) is a heavy black loam. The soil appears to be very deep, no subsoil noted. The soil retains sufficient moisture to grow good crops of grass and hay.
- (c) A spring in the SE portion affords plenty of water for denestic use. No water available for irrigation, and none can be developed for this purpose.

8. Agricultural Value:

- (a) The arable portion twenty five (25) acres will grow good crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn and other grains. Two acres of this amount will probably grow excellant gardens. These crops are grown on very similar land within 1/2 mile distance, and where soil conditions are practically the same as on this area. Hay crops yield about two tons per acre. There is very little demand for hay in this locality, when sold it usually brings about \$20.00 per ton. There are no roads for transporting crops grown, produce grown would necessarilly have to be utilized on the claim.
- (b) The cost of clearing the timber or brush covered portion of this area will be about 025.00 per acre. To prepare the open grass lands for tilling will not exceed \$5.00 per acre. This is the entire estinated cost of clearing, the applicant is probably prepared to do the work of clearing without hireing outside assistance.
- (c) In its present condition the land is worth about \$7.00 per acre. The land after being improved and prepared for cultivation is worth from \$12.00 to \$15.00 per acre.

9. Forest Value:

(a) 12 acres has a stand of yellow Pine averaging about 2 M ft. B.M. per acre, and 6 cords of Oak cord wood per acre. The Yellow Pine will not exceed 24 M ft. B.M., and its approximate value \$2.00 per M ft. A total valuation of \$48.00. The cordwood is of little or no value but can be used in the development of the claim. In most part, the pine will average about 150 years in age. No possible chance to dispose of this timber for many years to come, the land is very inacessible.

A good reproduction of Douglas Fir covering about two acres in the NW corner. an average of 500 seedlings per acre, in age it will average about 10 years.
